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## SITE FOR THE CONCORD INSTITUTE PURCHASED.

Beautiful and Central Location—Erecting of the Building to Begin at Once—School to Open in September.

Ed. STANDARD:—Your recent editorial relative to our giving up the High School grounds as a site for the "Concord Institute" caused some to fear that we would abandon the enterprise, but we would assure them to the contrary.

The facts were, that upon thorough investigation we found the title such that we could not have had control of the buildings after erecting them, and hence objectionable to the friends backing us in the work.

Upon learning that we could purchase the splendid property of Dr. Young, just opposite the Baptist church, so well and centrally located, for the reasonable sum of \$2,500, with good buildings, suitable to be easily enlarged into a commodious house for the "Institute," we all felt "that was the place," and accordingly have purchased same, upon which work will begin at once, so as to have all in readiness for opening the school work in September.

The friends will be glad to know that we have the premise of the second and larger building next year, or as soon as we may need it.

## A Beautiful Tribute to Him.

Editorially the Charlotte Observer pays the following tribute to Mr. S E Allen, who died suddenly in Winston Friday:

"The death of Capt. S E Allen, of Winston, is to be accounted a loss, not only to that town, but to the State. He became identified with the fortunes of Winston in 1876, and from the day he made that city his home, he was recognized as one of its leading spirits. His identity with the town was such that wherever, throughout the State, Winston was talked of, Syd Allen's name was apt to be mentioned in the same connection. It would be no play upon sentiment to say that his name has a place on Winston's cornerstone. His character as a business man had stood the test of years; socially he was a representative of the type of the ideal Southern gentleman, and in his passing, "a well-graced actor leaves the stage." He is a man who will be missed, a man whose memory will always be cherished and whose name will never be mentioned except in respect and reverence. "Good-night, good night! ... till it be morrow."

## Another Southern Carpet Mill.

The Anniston (Ala.) Carpet Company has been organized with a capital stock of \$50,000, for the manufacture of ingrain carpet. Sixty to seventy operatives will be employed and the output will be some 1,500 yards daily. This, however, will be only a starter, as the intention is to double the size of the mill and its output within a few months, ultimately developing into an immense carpet manufacturing industry. This is the second carpet mill started in the South. The other mill was lately started at Gaffney, S. C. —Southern Field.
