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COURT PROCEEDINGS

Nathaniel Fulham Is Found Guilty of Shooting Jno. Holdbrooks—Sentences to the Chain Gang.

State vs. Toney Morton, larceny. Not guilty.

State vs. D. H. Plott, assault with deadly weapon. Plead guilty and judgment suspended on payment of the costs.

State vs. Will Thompson, carrying concealed weapon, plead guilty and judgment suspended on payment of the costs.

State vs. Jno. Isenhour, retailing without license. Not guilty. In this case Judge Robinson reprimanded the jury considerably for not rendering a verdict of guilty against the negro. Several other cases were on the docket against the negro, though.

State vs. Will Morton, carrying a concealed weapon. Judgment suspended on payment of the costs.

State vs. Andrew Jackson, retailing without license. Found guilty and sentenced to the chain gang for three months.

State vs. John Holdbrooks, assault. Plead guilty and judgment suspended on payment of the costs. A nol pros was entered in case where he was charged with carrying a concealed weapon.

State vs. Esther Ried and Jim Ried, assault with deadly weapons. Esther Ried not guilty. Jim Ried found guilty and sentenced to the chain gang for six months.

The case of Nathaniel Fulham for the shooting of Jno. Holdbrooks, which affair occurred last Christmas in No. 3 township, was tried Friday afternoon. The jury returned a verdict of guilty. No disposition has been made of the case at this time.

State vs. Chas. Bost, carrying a concealed weapon. Found guilty and judgment suspended on payment of the costs.

State vs. Angeline Ellis, retailing without license. Found guilty. Judgment continued.

The case of Giles and Bud Pearson was tried, the former for concealing money stolen by his son, Bud Pearson. The boy plead guilty. The jury returned a verdict of guilty as to Giles Pearson, but he has not yet been sentenced.

State vs. Levi Partee, receiving stolen property. Found not guilty. In the case of retailing whiskey without license he was found guilty and sentenced to the chain gang for four months.

On account of the absence of some important witnesses the Foreman-Black case was continued until next court.

As we go to press the case of Mr. J. Ed. Henderson, for obstructing a public cart-way was being tried.

L. D. DUVAL RESIGNS.

His Resignation as Superintendent of the Cannon Mills Handed in to Take Effect After Thirty Days—It Means a Loss to Concord.

It will be a surprise to every one of our readers to learn that Mr. L. D. Duval, who is now superintendent of the Cannon mills, has tendered his resignation of that position which will take effect in thirty days. This is news that will meet the eyes of our people with regret as Mr. Duval is looked upon as one of our best townsmen and one who has the esteem and respect not only of those under his supervision but among our people.

Ten years ago Mr. Duval came to this place from Georgia to accept the position he now has. At that time there were under his direction 4,000 spindles and 130 looms. Now he is superintendent of 17,000 spindles and 520 looms.

This resignation means that Concord will lose Mr. and Mrs. Duval as Mr. Duval will later take part in mill work in Georgia.

Gone to Assist Maxton.

Messrs. Ernest Graves, Dolph Mangum and Billy LeGrande left Friday night for Wilmington where they went to assist the Maxton team in a game against the Wilmington boys. The Charlotte Observer says that the Maxton team made requisition on Charlotte for Graves, Mangum, LeGrande, Lambeth and Donnelly. This will do but Charlotte only furnished two of the players.

John DeArmond Dead.

John DeArmond, a young man of Charlotte, who is known by several in this place, and who spent Sunday here only a few weeks ago, died Thursday from an operation for appendicitis. He is a brother of Mr. Jean DeArmond, who comes here each day in the interest of Wadsworth Bros. livery business.

The First Bale.

New York, July 28.—Members of the Cotton exchange will auction the first bale of new cotton, now en route to New York, in front of the exchange today. The proceeds will be sent to the flood sufferers in central Texas. The bale was grown at Sinton, Texas, and was donated to the flood sufferers by a New Orleans cotton house, which paid a premium of one hundred dollars and the full market price for the bale. It will be passed from exchange throughout the country and it is expected that many thousands of dollars will be realized by successive auctions of the bale.
