TWO AWFUL ACCIDENTS.

Steamer Gangway Drops 100 People Into Deep Water--20 Dead--Trolley Car Tumbles 56 Feet--29 Dead.

Two of the most memorable and direful calamities noted for some time occurred in New England on last Sunday.

The one was at Bar Harbor, Maine, the other at Bridgeport, Connecticut.

The former was caused by the giving way of the leading platform as an excursion party overcrowded it. About 100 people were dropped into the deep water in which at least 20 were drowned, probably 30 or more. The scene was horrible in the extreme. The merry crowd was making a wild rush to get on the boat when suddenly so many found themselves struggling in the water with the fearful loss of life as stated.

The other was that of a trolley car that jumped the track and plunged, with its pack of passengers, 50 feet down into a drained off pond with its mud and mire. The car turned upside down and crushing its victims, held them as in a gripe. When cleared away there were 29 bodies that told the horror of the accident. There were 42 passengers. The rest were more or less injured except one child taken safely from the arms of its dying mother.

Smallpox Near Again.

A special to the Charlotte Observer says there is a genuine case of smallpox eight miles west of Salisbury. It is a negro man just from West Virginia. The case is quarantined and parties exposed are kept in restraint as far as apprehended.
