THE DAUGHTERS NEED HELP.

We want to emphasize a point with reference to the play by the Robert Downing Company Saturday night. The Daughters of the Confederacy get 25 per cent of the proceeds and from it they hope to realize enough to make a liberal response to a call from the Raleigh Soldiers' Home now in need of funds.

The play will doubtless be well worth the admission fee, but in addition to that each patron will be lending aid to those helpless veterans and will be encouraging a class of noble women in their tireless efforts to alleviate the sufferings of veterans wherever found, while conspiring to perpetuate in memory's rosier bowers the history of those who wore the gray. It is well to help and help those who help—to use strength to strengthen those whose strength is applied in a noble work.

Mr. E J Goodson, a life-long Republican, of Catawba county, in a letter to the Newton Enterprise, says he is heartily in favor of the amendment, and adds: "I can see very well how the office-holding members of the fusion party will oppose the amendment, but I can't see why a white man that votes the Republican ticket from principle can do so."

Representative DeVries, of California, has offered a bill in the house to repeal the duties that foster the paper trust. It simply serves to make the Republicans commit themselves against such reasonable measures for Democrats to offer them. To start to fight trusts in the proper and most practical way, that is to take away that which encourages them, would be to endanger the existence of trusts. They come too handy in campaign seasons.

"John Ruskin was a fearless critic, and made many enemies by his radical views," says the Indianapolis News. "He never considered the man or the friend in his criticisms. It was the work itself that concerned him. He once criticized, in his fearless way, the work of a well-known painter, who was much grieved at the effect. On hearing of the sorrow he had caused he wrote the artist that he regretted he could not speak more favorably of the picture, but hoped it would make no difference in their friendship." It is said the artist wrote in reply: "Dear Ruskin—Next time I meet you I shall knock you down, but I hope it will make no difference in our friendship."

The Julia Magruder Book Club lays many of us under obligations for the rich literary treat Tuesday night. Dr. Rakestraw we found to be a very pleasing speaker who throws himself so fully into the sentiment he is expressing that one seems carried back to its enactment, in utter oblivion of the present.

He recited from Shakespeare's plays of Mark Antony's burial of Cæsar and the colloquies of Cassius and Brutus, together with a number of poems of humorous and pathetic vein.

It was an evening of genuine enjoyment, and we hope the doctor will return ere long to gratify again our literary cravings.
