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SELLS LIFE DEARLY.

New Orleans Murderer Charles Kills Four More Men and Wounds Several. Then Dies—Bloody Epoch for the Crescent City.

The last of the New Orleans trouble was like a fatal clap at the close of a thunder storm.

It was learned that the negro Charles, who had killed Officers Day and Lamb, was in a house in the city. Officers went to arrest him and without warning he opened fire and killed one and fatally wounded another. While a Catholic Priest was ministering to the dying man a boy standing by the priest was killed by a shot from Charles. Later he killed another man and fatally wounded four and injured several others.

Charles was firing from a second story window. It was decided to burn him out, so a can of oil and a match was applied.

He came out to change locations and was killed. His body was riddled with bullets.

There were several other negroes gotten out of the house later and locked up, one being killed while resisting arrest.

With this terrible tragedy the New Orleans riot seems now over.

A strong police force is on hand.

EAGLE VS. TWO BOYS.

An Eagle Swoops Down on Two Boys and Gets Its Life Pounded Out With a Wagon Spoke.

The Independence, Kansas, Dispatch says that James and Grover Parker, living in the Indian Territory south of here, were on their way home a few days ago when a big bald eagle swooped down upon them knocking the younger brother to the ground senseless.

Before the elder brother, who is 11 years old, could realize what happened, the bird had struck him in the face and knocked him down.

As he started to get up the bird came at him a second time. The boy seized a wagon spoke that was lying near him and fought the eagle until he finally killed it.

Masonic Committee Present the Revolutionary Sword of Martin Phifer to His Great Grand Daughter, Mrs. J. M. Odell.

On Friday evening an episode of unusual interest occurred at the residence of Capt. J M Odell.

A committee, consisting of Mr. Jas. C Fink, W. M., and Mr. D A Caldwell, Tyler, representing Stokes Lodge No. 32, A. F. and A. M., presented the Captain and Mrs. Odell a sword that once belonged to Colonel Martin Phifer and which he carried as an officer in the Revolutionary war.

This valuable relic of colonial days has long been the property of this Masonic lodge, and because Mrs. Odell is a great-grand daughter of this venerable man, it was agreed to place it in her possession.

As the little party stood before an oil portrait of Col. Phifer, handled the ancient weapon, and talked of the pioneer history thereby linked with the present, feelings of emotion were awakened that will not soon fade from the memories of those present.

WELL FOR OUR MINISTERS.

A Good Report of M. E. Church at Concord at District Conference at New London.

We notice in the Salisbury Sun the report of the M. E. District conference at New London and the following report from the Concord Methodist churches:

Rev. J A B Fry, Central church, Concord: 217 members—a gain of 27; 70 church papers taken; a well organized and working congregation. Finances well up.

Rev. R M Hoyle, Forest Hill, Concord: 583 members—25 received this year. A large and prosperous Sunday school; collections for conference assessments and for ministerial support, all well in hand.

Rev. R G Barrett, Epworth, Concord: This charge is a mission station. It was reported as growing, but not yet ready to be made self-sustaining.

Rev. J S Nelson, Concord circuit: 500 members; average attendance of 75 per cent of members.

Porto Ricans Show Pro-Spanish.

They took little stock in the 4th of July but on the 26th the celebration of St Jagers, the patron saint of Spain, they displayed thousands of Spanish flags in the streets of San Juan.
