Silver Republican—William J Bryan, of Nebraska; Adlai E Stevenson, of Illinois.

Fusion Populist—William J Bryan, of Nebraska; Adlai E Stevenson, of Illinois.

Mid-Road Populist—Wharton Barker, of Pennsylvania; Ignatius Donnelly, of Minnesota.

Prohibition—John J Woolley, of Illinois; Henry B Metcalf, of Rhode Island.

Social Democrats—Eugene V Debs, of Indiana; Job Harriman, of California.

Social Labor—Joseph F Maloney, of Massachusetts; Valentine Remmel, of Pennsylvania.

United Christian—J F R Leonard, of Iowa; Charles M Sheldon, of Kansas.

Anti-Imperialist—William J Bryan, of Nebraska, no endorsement.

National—Donaldson Caffery, of Louisiana; Archibald M Howe, of Massachusetts.

National Union Reform—Seth

Ellis, of Ohio; Samuel T Nicholson, of Pennsylvania.
