BRYAN'S RETORT.

Would Debate With Hanna if the Latter is Really the Presidential Candidate.

We suppose as a master of the art of retort Mr. Bryan hardly has a revival among our public men of today.

The following was gotten off a few days ago at Fort Worth where he was making a speech:

Mr. Bryan's attention was called to a speech made at Delphia, Ind., by Senator Hanna, chairman of the Republican national committee, in which the Senator was quoted as saying he was ready to debate "imperialism" with Mr. Bryan or any other Democrat. In reply to the question whether he would accept a challenge from Hanna, Mr. Bryan said:

"I know nothing of the matter except what appears in the papers. The challenge has not been received and I would not accept it if it were. While I would be glad to debate public questions with the Republican candidate for the presidency, I would not be willing to debate with one whose responsibility is less than my own. If I am elected I shall be president. If the Republican committee will certify that Mr. Hanna is to be president, in case of Republican success, I shall willingly meet him in joint debate."

Mr. Bryan was also asked if he had anything to say in reply to Mr. Hanna's charge that he was influenced by sinister motives in securing the ratification of the treaty with Spain. To this he replied: "I have given my reasons for believing it better to ratify the treaty and declare the nation's policy by resolution, and the voters have an opportunity to pass judgment upon my reasons. I must confess, however that Mr. Hanna is an expert when he discusses sinister motives, but I can stand his criticism if Senator Hoar can endure his praise."

In his address Mr. Bryan referred to a report made by Senator Hanna and speech made by Mr. Hanna, yesterday, in which he said there are no trusts. When I used to want humorous reading I would go to those books which contained a collection of the writings of humorists. But now when I want to read something funny I read Mr. Hanna's serious campaign speeches. "There are no trusts." Can you expect the Republican party to destroy the trusts when the leader of the Republican party says there are no trusts?"

Effective July 22nd, trains Nos. 11 and 12, heretofore operated between Norfolk, Va., and Greensboro, N. C. via Selma, N. C. will be discontinued east of Raleigh, N. C. and operated between Raleigh and Greensboro, handling local sleeping car line between these points.

At the same time pullman sleeping car line No. 508, now operated between Norfolk, Va., and Charlotte, N. C. in connection with trains No. 11 and 12 via Selma and Greensboro, will be diverted and operated via Danville, Va. trains Nos. 3 and 4, 33 and 34, approximate schedules as follows:

No. 35, when running ahead of No. 7, flagged if necessary for through travel south of Charlotte, and is stopped for passengers arriving from Lynchburg or beyond. No. 36 stops regularly for passengers for Salisbury, Lexington, High Point, Greensboro, Reidsville, Danville, Lynchburg, Charlottesville and Washington. No. 37 stops for passengers coming from Lynchburg or points beyond, and to take on passengers for regular stopping places south of Newells. No. 38 stops to let off passengers from regular stopping places south of Newells and to take on passengers for regular stopping places, Lynchburg or beyond.

Nos. 33 and 34 stop at Concord for passengers to or from the C. O. & A. Division—Charlotte to Augusta—and other points in South Carolina, Georgia and Florida, reached through Columbia or Augusta. Also for through passengers to or from Richmond or Norfolk, Va. Nos. 7, 8, 11 and 12 are the local trains and connect at Salisbury with trains of W. N. C. Division.
