CAPS THE CLIMAX.

Peach Tree That Has Bore Eight Crops in Three Years.

Mr. D H Wilkinson, of No. 4 township, near Glass, caps the climax on a fruit-bearing peach tree. He has a young volunteer tree that bears three distinct crops every year with one slight exception. In '98 it matured three crops. In '99 the first bloom froze with all the other peach bloom but the second and third blooms came and matured fruit. This year again it has borne its three crops, a sample of two of which he presented to us today (Friday). The first crop comes about the middle of September, the second about the first of October and the third about the last of October.

Those of the first of the month are well preserved and are a little wilted but are of excellent flavor. The third crop is now mature but not fully ripe and are good for the stage of ripening.

The first crop is sharply tinged with red and are large; the second crop less tinged and are of medium size and the last crop has scarcely any tinge and are about the size of guinea eggs.

The tree this year bore about four bushels, the last crop being probably half a bushel only. This we think places Mr. Wilkinson at the head on prolific fruit trees.

Famous Men in Charlotte.

The vestibule carried two distinguished and famous individuals by here this morning: General Wheeler and Lieutenant Hobson. They were en route to Montgomery, Ala., to be guests of the city during gala week. General Wheeler is, as known, 64. He is very gray and as small in stature as ever.

STRIKE IN ALAMANCE.

Only a Few Mills Running in Full—Both Sides Make Demands.

As usual, coercion excites resentment and a strike is on with no apparent way of adjustment.
