### TOWN SWEEP AWAY.

Five Hundred People Escape Just in Time.

An El Paso, Texas, dispatch of the 20th says:

A messenger has reached here from Guadeloupe, Texas, with news that that place has been completely swept off the face of the earth by a water spout. Not a house is left standing. On Wednesday the citizens heard a roaring up the mountains where the storm was raging. Fearing a flood they fled to the second foot hills just in time to escape the deluge of water that swept through the village of five hundred inhabitants. So far as was known when the messenger left only one or two children were drowned.

### At the Baptist Church.

Sunday was a day of more than usual interest in the services at the Baptist church, where a protracted meeting has been in progress during the past week. At the Sunday School session at 9 o'clock Rev. B L Hoge addressed the pupils and teachers in a brief but impressive sermon, with the result of one profession of faith, and a general interest manifested by everyone present.

Morning services opened at 11 o'clock with a good congregation, and after a spirited season of praise and prayer Mr. Hoge quoted his text from 1st Cor. 1:26-27, Neglect of "Little Things." After an animated discourse of thirty minutes the ordinance of Baptism was performed and the congregation dismissed.

At 3 o'clock a testimony service was held, at which the Spirit was present with marked existence, and tears of joy glistened in every eye.

At 7:30 o'clock p. m., the auditorium was filled to overflowing, many persons being obliged to take seats upon the edge of the platform. Rev. Mr. Hoge took his text from Matt. 16:27-28, the theme being "The soul and its inestimable value." At the termination of an impressive discourse, thirty-five persons presented themselves for prayer and profession.

These services will be continued during this week, at 3 o'clock in each afternoon and at 7:45 every evening, to which a cordial invitation is extended to all.

On next Sunday the dedication of the church will take place. Dr. Charles A G Thomas, of Raleigh, will deliver the sermon for the occasion at the usual morning hour. The service on that night at 7:30 will probably terminate the revival season.
