GOOD REPORT FROM CUBA.

Gen. Wood Reports Prosperity—3,000 Schools and 150,000 Pupils—Courts Established—United States Troops Unneeded—Immense Tobacco and Sugar Crops.

Gen. Leonard Wood, Governor General of Cuba is in America and in a Washington dispatch gives some insight into Cuban affairs which are intensely satisfactory.

The United States troops have not been called on this year to maintain order but it is maintained by 1200 native police with native officers.

Courts have been instituted in all the principal cities and the writ of habeas corpus has been established. Prisons have been improved and prisoners have been equitably disposed of.

Three thousand schools have been established and 150,000 children are in the schools and the number is constantly increasing.

Gen. Wood says the two eastern provinces have thus far this season been free from yellow fever for the first time in their history and he hopes with contemplated sewerage to free Havana and its suburbs.

A good mail service has been established.

He says the government is entirely self supporting and the treasury now contains an unincumbered balance of \$1,500,000.

The tobacco crop last year was immense and the sugar crop this year will be well nigh 600,000 tons. He estimates the sugar and tobacco crops this year at \$100,000,000.

He says that to the best of his knowledge and belief the people realize that they are making great progress and feel kindly toward the people of the United States and have faith in them.
