MRS. D. M. RITCHIE DEAD.

Stricken With Jaundice and Dies of A Daughter of Mr. 6 H Weddington Congestive Chill-was Nearly 67 Years Old-Community in Sorrow.

Mrs. D M Ritchie died at her home on South Union street Sunday night at 1 o'clock. She had been quite "ill for several days of jaundice but rested well Saturday night and seemed better. At 11 o'clock Sunday she took a congestive chill and passed into unconsciousness or inability to speak and continued so till she breathed her last.

Mrs. Ritchie's maiden name was Miss Tryphena Miller. She was born June 14th, 1835, and was therefore nearing her 67th birthday.

She was married in 1855. In June, 1886, she was bereft of her husband by a stroke of lightning and left to rear a family of children, a task at which few succeed and the missiles even crashed so well.
