RCRAL free deliveny mail Four Routes in the Connty-How Tiry trains, Run-Postoffices That wiil Be Abandoned, Causing the Mails to Remain in Concurd Post Office if Boxes are Net Put Up.
Now that we are to have four rural free delivery routes in the county there is much that should be borne in mind.
Route No. 1 goes southwest from Concord along the Charlotte road to the Pitts school house, thence northwest along the Poplar Tent road to the Henderson place, thence west along the Springsville road to Cox's mill, thence east along the Springsville road to Concord. This route embraces 17 square miles and will supply 130 homes and 590 people. Mr. J Mc. Cald well is the carmer.
No. 2 goes northwest from Concord along the Salisbury road northwest and north along the office, thence south along the Charlotte road to Tulin post office, thence southeast along the new road to the D C Furr place thence southeast along the Salis 18 squapo miles with 150 houses Mr. OHiveople to receive manl.
