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ANTI-TRUST LAWS UNCONSTITUTIONAL.

Exemption of Agricultural Products and Live Stock Renders Them of No Effect.

Washington, D. C., March 10.—The United States Supreme Court today decided the Illinois anti-trust statute to be unconstitutional because of the provision of the law exempting agricultural products and live stock from the operations of the law. The decision was rendered in the case of Thomas Connelly and others against the Union Sewer Pipe Company, of Ohio, and was delivered by Justice Harlan.

The decision of the court in effect declares unconstitutional the anti-trust laws of Georgia, Illinois, Indiana, Louisiana, Michigan, Mississippi, Montana, Nebraska, North Carolina, South Dakota, Tennessee, Texas Wisconsin. In each of these States there is an exemption in favor of live stock and agricultural products in the hands of the raiser or producer, or of labor organizations. Under the rulings of the court, anti-trust to be constitutional must apply indiscriminately to all commissions with no exemptions or exceptions whatever.

EX-GOV. JOHN P. ALTGELD DEAD.

Overdid His Strength at Pro-Boer Meeting and Was Seized With Apoplexy.

Ex-Governor John P. Altgeld died in his room at Hotel Monroe at Joliet, Ill., at 7 o'clock on the morning of the 12th.

He was the principal speaker at a pro-Boer mass meeting the night before and being a man of great extremes he overdid his delicate strength and was seized with apoplexy just at the close of his speech. He became unconscious about midnight.

LOVE POISONING CASE ON.

Gathering of Strong Legal Lights at Albemarle.

The Albemarle correspondent to The Charlotte Observer says: "The trial of John and Ellet Knotts, colored, the accused poisoners of the late Dr. S J Love, has been set for Thursday morning at 9 o'clock. A special venire of 75 men have been summoned, from whom to select the jury. More than a hundred witnesses are to be examined and this case promises to consume the balance of the time. The following visiting lawyers are in attendance: Messrs. Lee S Overman and J S Henderson, of Salisbury; B F Long, of Statesville; W J Montgomery, of Concord; C D Cennett, of Charlotte; T J Jerome, of Monroe; C A Armstrong, of Troy, and Harlep McCall, of Lexington. The latter is here presumably in the interest of the candidacy of E E Page, Esq., of Lexington, for the judgeship of this district before the next Democratic convention. Mr. Long, of Iredell, is also a candidate and has quite a strong following in this county."

RIVER BOAT DISASTER.

Twenty Drowned on the Mississippi—Squall Struck the Boat and Capsized It.

Twenty of the passengers and crew of the Providence, plying between Vicksburg and Lake Palmyra, were drowned on the 12th by the boat's capsizing in a sudden squall that struck the boat at 2 o'clock at night. Only nine escaped. The boat turned bottom upward in water 40 feet deep and there was no chance to escape.

DEATHS IN A CYCLONE.

At Least Ten Persons Killed in a Mississippi Storm.

Vicksburg, Miss., March 12.—A cyclone swept through the southern end of Copiah and the northern section of Lincoln counties early today, killing at least half a dozen people and leveling buildings, fences, etc. Montgomery, a village in Copiah, and the Illinois Central Railroad were the worst sufferers and four bodies are known to be under buildings. Three miles further a railroad camp was wrecked and three negroes killed. A passenger train on the Illinois Central road was struck by the storm and every window in each coach was shattered. At Hazelhurst considerable damage was done but no lives lost. Wires are down in all directions and it is impossible to hear from outlying districts.
