At Tuscumbia, Ala., Sunday, the 6th, was signalized by a desperate and fatal encounter between legal officers and a negro desperado named Will Reynolds. Sheriff Gassaway and brother, Will Gassaway, attempted to arrest him when he opened fire on them, fatally wounding both with a Winchester. The vicious monster was so accurate in his aim that he killed two and wounded five more before he could be killed. Dynamite was used and the house was also riddled with bullets but it had to be set on fire before he could be driven out and shot. His carcass was then thrown into the burning house. 
Esquire H C Cook elosed his school in No. 10 on last Satur day. He had a good program and had the Leo Brass Band. The occasion was attended with much interest.
