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VETERANS MEET.

Goodly Number Will Go to Dallas—The Camps Called on for Contributions to Davis Monument.

Camp No. 212 U. C. V. met in the court house on Saturday, April 5th, Commander, H B Parks, in the chair. He explained the object of the meeting to be to ascertain the number of persons who will attend the reunion at Dallas, and introduced Mr. Phillips, a representative of the Southern Railway, who presented the conditions best suited to economy and the comfort of those who will go. Thirty-five fares are the minimum for a special car. To charter a car and keep it at Dallas was found to be impractical. Commander Parks reported such progress as led him to believe that the required thirty-five persons would go.

The secretary was requested to read a letter from Mrs. S Thomas McCullough, President of the Jefferson Davis Monument Association, appealing to the various Camps to give one dollar per member in this one supreme effort that is now being made by the noble band of women to erect that grand monument to the Confederacy and its only President, Jefferson Davis, to be unveiled on his birthday in 1903 in the city of Richmond.

On motion it was ordered that the secretary make collection of such sums as Veterans will contribute and turn the sums over to Mrs. Jno. P Allison who will embody the same in her report and such sums will be accredited to North Carolina.

Commissioners Meeting.

At the meeting of the County Commissioners on Monday, the 7th, two petitions came up for a change in the public roads in No. 3 township. The changes are advertised for objection if there be any.

The petition for change in road in Poplar Tent neighborhood, having been published and no objections being presented, the board ordered that a jury lay off the road according to petition.

The usual routine matters came up and were disposed of.

Jurors were drawn for the May term of court and tax listers were appointed.

Fare and Badges for Reunion.

For the benefit of those going to the Dallas reunion we will say that the fare will be \$23.50 from here. Tourist sleeping car berths cost \$3.50. If two take a berth it will cost \$1.75 each.

By order of the executive committee of Camp 212 the Secretary ordered 25 badges on the 5th inst which, when they arrive, will cost 20 cents each, but will be good for all occasions.

DESPERATE NEGRO IN ALABAMA.

Kills and Wounds Nine Men Before He Could be Killed.

At Tusculumbia, Ala., Sunday, the 6th, was signalized by a desperate and fatal encounter between legal officers and a negro desperado named Will Reynolds. Sheriff Gassaway and brother, Will Gassaway, attempted to arrest him when he opened fire on them, fatally wounding both with a Winchester. The vicious monster was so accurate in his aim that he killed two and wounded five more before he could be killed. Dynamite was used and the house was also riddled with bullets but it had to be set on fire before he could be driven out and shot. His carcass was then thrown into the burning house.
