## MRS. DR. BARNHARDT DEAD.

Attacked Monday With Appendicitis and Neuralgia of the Heart Later, She Yielded Life Today at 10 a. m.

The shocking tidings came this (Wednesday) morning, of unexpected death of Mrs. Dr. Charles H Barnhardt of Mt. Pleasant.

She was attacked with appendicitis on Monday and it was contemplated to have an operation this morning and Drs. Lilly and Young, were called. Neuralgia of the heart set in, however, and did its fatal work today at 10 o'clock before the operation began.

Mrs. Barnhardt's maiden name was Miss Ella Ridenhour. She was a daughter of Esq. D H Ridenhour and sister to our townsman, Mr. R E Ridenhour. She was about 28 years old.

She leaves a devoted husband and three children beside a father and mother, a sister and three brothers.

Mrs. Barnhardt connected herself with the Lutheran church in early girlhood. After marriage she united herself with the Methodist church with her husband. She was conspicuously useful and devoted to the church and its interests.

The funeral services will be conducted by her pastor, Rev. Mr. Pickens, on Thursday.

Our sympathies are extended to the stricken husband and motherless children and others who bear heavily the terrible shock.

## REUNION IN FULL BLAST.

One Hundred and Twenty-Five Thousand Visitors Cared for—Gen. Gordon Arrives Late but Makes a Fine Speech—Mayor Gives Key to "Kaliph" Who Gives it to Gen. Gordon.

Dallas, Texas, is about the most packed city now to be found. It is estimated that there are 125,000 visitors present and that there are 80,000 in the far grounds in tents.

Gen. Gordon was delayed twenty hours and all hope of his arrival was abandoned when he suddenly came in at 1:15 p. m. Tuesday amid deafening applause. He made one of his characteristically beautiful and learned speeches all full of pride in the Confederate soldiery and teeming with affectionate tributes.

The Kaliph parade, which is something like the New Orleans Mardi Gras, took place Tuesday and the mayor of the city in solemn address gave the key of the city, a great gilded key to "His Unutterable Exaltedness" the Caliph who then, through an interpreter, handed the key to Gen. Gordon.
