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MISS McINTOSH TRIES SUICIDE.

A Nurse Recently Returned From St. Peter's Hospital Shoots Herself Near Carthage.

Carthage, June 14.—Miss Montie McIntosh made what is likely to prove a successful attempt at suicide yesterday evening at the home of her uncle, David Dunlap, about eight or ten miles west of here. It is learned that Mr. Dunlap left her alone at the house during the afternoon as well and cheerful as ever so far as he knew. Some time afterwards he heard a pistol shot at the house and upon investigation found Miss McIntosh on the floor with a pistol wound in her left breast—the ball having passed through her lung and lodging in her back. It is said that her recovery is doubtful. No cause for the act can be ascribed.

Miss McIntosh's parents live in Wilmington, but she has spent much of her time among relatives in this county, where she is well connected and highly esteemed. She had recently returned from St. Peter's Hospital, at Charlotte, where she was employed as trained nurse.

Mrs. Thornwell White Dead.

Mrs. Thornwell T White died at 2:30 a. m. today (Monday) at the home of her widowed sister-in-law, Mrs. James White, near Mt. Ulla, Rowan County.

She had been afflicted with inflammatory rheumatism and a complication of very reducing nature sat in a few days ago which quickly did its fatal work.

Mrs. White's maiden name was Miss Margaret Hopkins of Baltimore. She was a sister of Mrs. Dr. Marsh.

One year ago in the month of June she was united in marriage to him who now so soon suffers the bereavement of a young and lovely bride.

She was 19 years of age.

The remains will arrive here tonight and will be buried tomorrow in the city cemetery.
