Educational matters in Cabarrus are still developing along a substantial line. A splendid object lesson is given us by the Harrisburg section. That community together with its friends has raised four hundred dollars for a school house.

A meeting of the subscribers was held Wednesday at Harrisburg and the project assumed definite shape. Messrs. J E Caldwell, J F Alexander, D L Morrison, Jno. C Garmon and W. Ed Harris were elected trustees.

Mr. Ed Harris was in town today (Thursday) to arrange for a meeting of the County Board of Education, when the trustees will tender the above subscription and its local support as a nucleus for the erection of a modern, up-to-date school building in an educationally aroused community. There is some probability of the house being built of brick.

The chairman of the Board of Education, Mr. Jas. P Cook, has called the meeting for 9:30 Aug. 4th. He is satisfied the Board will greatly appreciate this splendid liberality and earnestness of the Harrisburg folks and will treat with due consideration this business-like move.

NEWS CULLINGS.

Emperor William has been advised not to make his contemplated trip into the Polish regions of his domain for fear of violence to him. He is little disposed to forego his sense of duty under the counsels of his more timid advisors.

Losses by the Camden fire are now estimated at \$70,000. The fire is said to have started from a lamp explosion.

Fire broke out in Anapolis, Md., Wednesday morning and destroyed nine buildings, including St. Martins E. L. Church. The entire loss is estimated at \$50,000.

Harry Tracy has been heard from again. He turned up at a logging Camp near Tacoma, Wash., on Wednesday uninjured and in good trim. He ate a hearty dinner. He has his gun and two pistols with plenty of ammunition.

President Mitchell of the United Mine Workes seems to have struck the key to the situation. The plan of operation by sympathetic strikes is abandoned and the plan of assessing those at work to enable the strikers to hold out is meeting with success. The Illinois branch has just sent in \$50,000. This makes \$100,000 given by the Illinois miners within four weeks.

The executors of Matt Clark, who was killed at the railroad crossing at Charlotte some time ago, have sued the Southern for \$20,000.
