Severe Injuries by a Runaway.

As Mr. Martin Lambert with his wife and child was driving Saturday evening near Bala Mill his horse ran away and inflicted severe injuries on Mrs. Lambert and child. The mother suffered several cuts and bruises, the worst being a six inch cut of the scalp to the bone. Dr. Walker dressed the wounds and while no permanent injury is found it ranks as a severe runaway accident.

MRS. PRITCHARD DEAD.

Passed Away Saturday at 1 a. m. of Internal Cancer at Biltmore Hospital.

The wife of Senator Pritchard died in Barker Memorial Hospital, Biltmore, at 1 o'clock a. m. Saturday. She was afflicted with internal cancer and had undergone a second operation Friday which was regarded as very critical but the only hope of prolonging life. She was conscious for a while in the evening in which she availed herself of some parting words to her husband and other relatives.

The Senator is deeply distressed. He was intensely devoted to her.

The floral tributes were profuse and very many messages of sympathy and condolence were received.

The body was taken to Marshall in the afternoon by special car.

The pall-bearers were: Charles McNamee, E P Kissick, H S Hardwick, C A Moore, James E Boyd and John A Nicholas.

The funeral was held today at 2 o'clock and the remains were laid to rest in the family burying ground.

This is the third time that the Senator has bowed under the bereavement of a bosom companion and he is the object of much sympathy from every philanthropic heart.

An Insane Boy.

This morning in the clerk's office a widowed mother, Mrs. Ella Smith, of No. 2 township, was signing papers for the admittance of her twelve-year-old son, Roy, to the asylum. The boy has been mentally deranged since he was very young and as he has grown older his condition has grown worse until he has lost his mind completely. At times he becomes violent and with his growing strength it has become dangerous for the members of his family to live with him, and on slight provocation he threatens to kill.

It is the earnest hope that the boy will find admittance at once in the hospital at Morganton for by the worn and sad expression of the mother's face can be seen the burden that this child has been to her.

Three Boys Drowned.

Pittsburg, Aug. 3.—Three boy bathers were drowned today in the Allegheny river, at the foot of Sixteenth street. Their names are Wm. J. Carroll, aged 15; Aniel Kologneski, aged 12, and an unknown boy, aged about 12. None of the boys could swim and in wading about two of them got beyond their depth in a hole made by a dredge boat. The Carroll boy lost his life in attempting to save his companions.
