CHATTANOOGA THE REUNION CITY 1913.

Will Merge Blue and Gray in Gettysburg Celebration Next Year.

Macon, Ga., May 8.—The choosing of Chattanooga, Tenn., as the reunion city for 1913, the unanimous, enthusiastic acceptance of the invitation of General Trimble, commander-in-chief of the G. A. R., to merge the blue and the gray in a celebration at Gettysburg in July, 1913. The crowning of Miss Mary Scandrett of Macon, as queen of the 1912 reunion before 20,000 people on Coleman's Hill and a Georgia sun melting mallowly over the city all day, featured the third day of the twenty-second annual reunion of the Confederate veterans in Macon today.

All is in readiness for the two big features of tomorrow—the election of commander-in-chief to succeed the late Gen. George W. Gordon and the parade of the long line of gray that will file through wide and shaded streets of Macon in the annual march of old and feeble men who fought for the Confederacy.

Tomorrow it is generally conceded that Gen. B. L. H. Young of Louisville, Ky., will be elected commander-in-chief of the United Confederate Veterans. The supporters of Lieut. Gen. Irvine Walker of Charleston, have not given up the fight, but it is understood that the entire Georgia, Alabama, Tennessee, Kentucky, Florida and trans-Mississippi delegates are pledged to Young as against the strength of the Virginians Maryland and Carolinas for Walker.

When the report of the committee on resolutions was read, it was found that one clause had to do with General Trimble's invitation for a joint reunion of blue and gray at Gettysburg, July 3, 4, 5 and 6 and recommended that the invitation be declined.

The convention, as a whole, however, struck out that clause and with practical unanimity adopted in its stead one written by Gen. O. Irvine Walker, accepting the invitation. It was passed with enthusiasm.

The Board of Aldermen of Salisbury held a busy meeting Tuesday night. Among the matters passed on were the following:

A petition being presented by the citizens of South Fulton Street to have that thoroughfare oiled was received and it was agreed that the city would do the oiling provided the said citizens furnish the oil. When the ladies get their clothes soiled sufficiently with the resultant mixture of oil and mud this mode of street sprinkling will lose some of its supposed popularity.

The great army of street sweepers are to be clothed in white duck. Two whole suits have been ordered.

SYNOD RE-ELECTS DR. KINARD HEAD.

The North Carolina Lutheran Synod spent a very busy day Wednesday in session at St. Mark's church on North Tryon Street. The morning was featured by the reading of President Kinard's annual report and by the election of officers. The afternoon was largely consumed in hearing individual reports from the various pastorates within the bounds of the Synod and in the evening two illuminating addresses were heard.

The synod then went into the election of officers for the ensuing year with the following result:

President, Rev. Dr. M. M. Kinard of Salisbury. (Re-elected.)

Vice president, Rev. J. E. Shenck of Greensboro. (Re-elected.)

Secretary, Rev. T. C. Parker of Barber.

Treasurer, James D. Heilig of Salisbury. (Re-elected.)

The newly-chosen officers were then installed, the prescribed charge being read to them by Rev. Dr. G. D. Bernheim, the father of the Synod. A brief report was read by the retiring secretary, Rev. J. E. Shenck, showing that matters on this important desk are practically clear up to date.
