The New Block System Brings Other Changes.

Quite a change has taken place along the Southern Railway lines since the installation of the new automatic block system last Sunday. A large number of telegraphers have been cut off or have been moved to other points. The office at Glass has been closed entirely and only one remains here, H. H. Troutman, who will attend to the duties of telegrapher and will post the arrival and departure of trains as usual. Mr. Troutman will be on duty during the day and the telegraph department will be closed after the arrival of No. 35. This new system greatly simplifies the companies business and considerably reduces the number of employees along its route.

The depot here, inside and out, has been wired for electric lights and as soon as the juice is turned on there will be some difference in appearance here.

Largest Animal on Earth.

Sparks' World Famous Shows are billed to exhibit at Salisbury Thursday, April 10, and from the newspaper reports preceded their exhibition will be worth going many miles to witness.

Among the many features the show carries is claimed to be the largest land animal on earth. It is an elephant said to be three inches taller than Jumbo and a half ton heavier.

Some idea of her immense size can be obtained when you consider that she is 11 feet, 7 inches tall and weighs over 5 tons. In other words she weighs as much as ten ordinary horses.

Another extraordinary feature with the show is Capt. Wesley's troupe of educated Seals and Sea Lions. These interesting sea animals perform the most seemingly impossible feats balancing chairs, umbrellas and whirling brands of fire while climbing ladders, walking tight ropes and riding the backs of galloping horses. This feature baffles description and must be seen to be appreciated.

Many other wonderful things are to be seen with this mammoth show, and the main performance beneath the big tents will present a number of the most marvelous foreign acts of the century.

The menagerie of wild animals carried with the show is complete in every detail, and contains rare and curious specimens of the earth's most interesting and curious animals.

A mile long street parade of dazzling splendor, beautiful women and handsome horses, interspersed with three brass bands and a steam caliope will traverse the streets shortly before noon, and this feature alone will be worth going many miles to see.

Robert M. Phillips Dead.

Greensboro, April 2.—Robert Masten Phillips, associate editor of The Greensboro Daily News, died suddenly of heart failure at his country home near Carthage tonight. He went there last week for a ten-day rest after strenuous work during his attendance at the late session of the State Senate, in which body he served as reading clerk.

Mr. Phillips was a practical printer and rose from the ranks to the editorial desk. After a short career in Moore County he aided in the establishment of The Greensboro Telegram in 1896, was later city editor and associate editor of The Raleigh Morning Post and editor of The Newbern Daily Sun. He came to The Greensboro News as associate editor in 1909.

Robert M. Phillips was one of the best known and most popular newspaper men of this State. He was once president of the State Press Association and at present a member of the executive committee. He had been a leader and prominent figure in the good-roads movement in this State and was prominent in Church and fraternal circles.

Mr. Phillips was known in Salisbury. He was one of the prominent editors there during the recent State convention and accompanied the party to Whittier. Heart disease was the cause of his death.

Owing to the resignation of Jas. N. Dayvault, H. C. Miller has been employed as clerk at Templeton & Yost's.



DEATHS

Mrs. Martin Blackwelder, aged about 80 years died Monday night at her home near Landis after an illness of several weeks. The funeral was held Tuesday afternoon at Lutheran Chapel, near China Grove, and the interment was in the cemetery at that place. Deceased leaves to mourn her death, a devoted husband, four sons and three daughters, all of whom were at her bedside at the time of her death, thirty-six grand children, seven great-grand children, two brothers, two sisters and a host of relatives and friends. She was a life-long, faithful and consistent member of Lutheran Chapel E. L. church from which she was buried the day following her death. A very large concourse of people attended the funeral services which was conducted by her pastor, Rev. C. A. Brown, assisted by the Rev. B. S. Brown, of Landis, after which her body was tenderly laid to rest in Green Lawn Cemetery to await the resurrection of the just. Sorrowing ones, you mourn, but not as those who have no hope. "Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord."

Miss Mary Elisabeth Albright, familiarly known as "Aunt Betsy," was found dead in bed Thursday morning. Aunt Betsy was in her 70th year. The funeral services were held in the home, four miles north of China Grove, Thursday at 4:00 p. m., by her pastor, Rev. C. A. Brown, after which she was buried in the Albright graveyard in the vicinity of Mill Bridge.

Aunt Betsy leaves to mourn her death, many friends and relatives, for she was loved by everybody that knew her. She has been a life-long faithful and consistent member of Lutheran Chapel church, and in her death this church loses one among her best members. —Leroy Wilhelm and wife lived with Miss Albright and he will probably inherit her estate.

An infant of Mr. and Mrs. Marshall Orrin's died Wednesday morning and the funeral was held at Mt. Moriah church yesterday afternoon, Rev. B. S. Brown officiating. The interment was in the cemetery near the church.

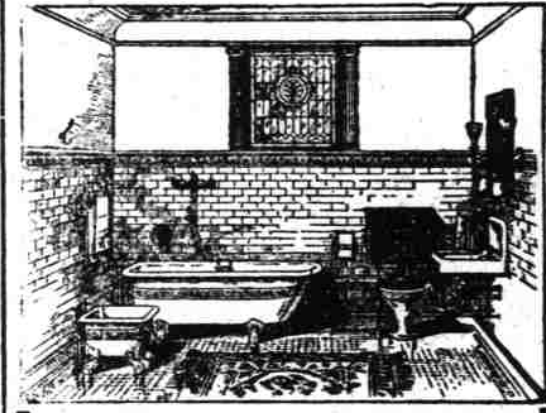
