Danish West Indies Ours.

Sovereignty over the Danish Indies, after half a century of negotiations passed January 16 to the United States with the exchange of ratifications of the purchase treaty by Secretary Lansing and Danish Minister Bruu. The actual physical transfer with the raising of the American flag will take place upon payment of the \$25,000,000 purchase price, which Congress will provide in a few weeks.

During the interim, the government of the island will be administered by the terms of the treaty a joint commission is to begin work immediately to arrange the details of the transfer.
