Last Saturday afternoon the old church building occupied for many years by St. Marks E. L. Congregation was auctioned off by our postmaster, G. G. Blackwelder. The bidding was quite lively and the highest bidder was H. T. Graber and J. F. Cooper, who paid the sum of \$152 for same, which includes all except the windows, bell and inside furniture.

The contract for tearing down the building was given to Mr. A. Klutz, who has a force of eight or ten men engaged on the work and he expects to complete the job tomorrow evening.

The construction of the new building will begin next week, the specification having been signed by the contractors and building committee.

The building committee has secured the consent of the school committee to use the graded school an auditorium during the time of building the new church where the services will be held at the regular hours.
