Automobile Accident Near Concord.

Last Friday when Vance Miller of China Grove, and a party of young folks were near Concord, with Mr Miller driving a large new automobile, what might have been a much more serious accident took place. Mr Miller was on a narrow strip of macadam and a negro was approaching, also on the macadam. The negro refused to divide the road with the auto and Mr Miller had gotten pretty close to the team before seeing that he was expected to turn out entirely. This caused a much sharper and quicker turn than usual and going at a fair speed, he probably lost control of the machine.

It was just after a rain and the mud was slick which added to the difficulty and aided in the wreck. As the machine struck the macadam the rear wheels crushed and all turned over a time or two. Mr Miller's collar-bone was broken and he was otherwise bruised, and Miss Lora Ritchie's collar-bone was dislocated and it is feared that her skull was injured. They were taken to a hospital in Concord and are getting along nicely. The other occupants of the car, Misses Myrtle Ritchie and Asbury, Max and Berlin Weaver were uninjured. The car, beside the destruction of the rear wheels, was otherwise badly damaged and it will cost several hundred dollars to have it repaired.

Mr. Miller is now at home and seems to be in his usual good condition, with the exception of having his arm in a sling.

Miss Ritchie, whom it was thought was right seriously injured, is still in the hospital, but is rapidly recovering from the shock and wounds received.

SALISBURY AND ROWAN COUNTY LOCALS

Chief of Police J F Miller went to Fort Oglethorpe Wednesday morning with a young man who had deserted from the army.

The boards of county commissioners were in session Monday and Tuesday.

Dr J P Long of Mansfield, Ohio, will preach in St John's Lutheran church in Salisbury, Sunday morning and at 8 o'clock, will address a mass meeting in the tabernacle to which the public generally is invited. Dr Long is preaching on the Protestant Reformation which is to be celebrated in November.

Ed W Dunham of Salisbury, who has been agent for the Southern at Concord for some time, has resigned and accepted a position at Badin.

Hon. Theo F Klutz of Salisbury, made a patriotic address at Albemarle, Monday night under the auspices of the Red Cross. He had a good size crowd and made a splendid address as usual.

Last week the Secretary of State granted charters to the Yedkin Realty Company and the Army Supply Company of Salisbury, each with a capital of \$25,000. The latter company intends to make gun covers, gloves, hats, suits, etc, for the army.

Oscar Phillips, son of P M Phillips of Rockwell, a young man with bright prospects for the future and a member of the legislature, has decided to go into the navy or aviation corps. He has stood the examination for the navy.

Carl H Vucannon of Spencer, has been appointed army seal clerk at a salary of \$100 per month. Mr Vucannon has been making his home in Wilmington during the past year.

The public service company has been trying their new one-man cars on the branch line running out to the fair grounds. The old cars will not be discarded.

Owing to an alarm of fire turned in Monday night of last week, the fire department went to the corner of 6th and Cemetery streets, where the grocery store of J W Lang was burning. The fire did not do much damage but the water did.

Last Monday one dozen applications for marriage licenses were made to the Rowan Register of Deeds.

Hattie Massey, colored, having been caught recently as she alighted from a south-bound train, with a suit case full of liquor, was fined \$150 and costs or six months at the workhouse, in the county court last Friday.

An automobile driven by a young man from Lexington turned over near Frankfort last Wednesday. About \$100 damage was done to the auto

and the young man was sent on the arm. He was arrested for being drunk after returning to Salisbury, but was let off with costs.

The handsome big brick school building, on the Rowan side at Kannapolis, is expected to be completed to be complete within a month, if there is nothing to retard the progress now being made by the contractor, E L Fleming of Landis.

Only by the generosity of J W Cannon, president of the cotton mills at Kannapolis, was this splendid building made possible, for, beside donating the site he has given one-half of the cost of construction, while the school board of Rowan county has looked after the work and supplied the other one-half in cash.
