# Huns Kill 50 Girls in Ambulance Park.

London, July 10.-In a recent German raid on the Belgians, more than 50 girls were killed by air bombs launched upon an ambulance park at La Panne, behind the Yser front. According to a special dispatch from the Hague 50 bombs were dropped on the immediate neigborhood of the park and several struck a large villa about a hundred yards from the hospital.

Of the many girls in the villa engaged in making bandages and repairing linen for the wound ed, 30 were instantly killed or died from injuries' within in a few minutes, 40 injured were removed to the villa, of whom 20 died later.
