Deputy Clincher of Iredell County Dead.
Statesville, Aug. 4 — Ralph Conner, the slayer of Deputy Sheriff Lloyd Cloninger of Mooresville was caught at 11 o'clock today by a Sheriff's posse about six miles this side of Concord after an all night search of all roads radiating from the scene of the shooting.

Lloyd Cloninger died last night at 10 o'clock of his wounds received yesterday evening in the terrific battle with the negroes.

The Conner brothers, two of them, Sinclair and Johnston, were brought here last night and after the physician's examinations of their wounds were placed in jail.

Ralph Conner in charge of Deputy Neal and Officer Brown, of Mooresville, was delivered to the jail here at noon today, but is feeling ill, running high against the alleged murderers they were spirited away by Sheriff M. P. Alexander and his deputies and taken to Winston-Salem for safekeeping.

This is the second deputy sheriff to be killed by lawless negroes in this county within the year.

Home Coming Day Observed at Lower Stone Church.
Sunday was a great day for Lower Stone Reformed church in the lower section of Rowan. In fact the first Sunday in August each year is a great day for this church. This is a home-coming day when many of the members of this old historic church come back for a day. A feature of the day's program was the appearance of Rev and Mrs F. L. Vesperman, local people, who will sail August 27, for Japan to become missionaries of the Reformed church. Rev F. R. Lefevre, of Greensboro, preached at the 11 o'clock hour and there were addresses by other visiting ministers. A large number from Salisbury were in attendance upon the program which continued through the day.

The home of Frank Merbride in the South River neighborhood was destroyed by fire Sunday together with all contents. The family consisting of Mr and Mrs Merbride were away from home at the time and lost all their possessions except the clothing they had on.
