We find in the east Health Bulletin the following reports of the health in Cabarrus:
Dr. Robert S. Young, Concord. Two cases of scarlatina, four of diphtheria and fourteen of typhoid fever. Typhoid, malarial and catarrhal fevers in almost all parts, of other public buildings first class.
Six cases of whooping-cough, four of scarlatina and three of typhoid fever. Malarial fever and catarrhal affections in various parts.
Spiritus—Dr. J. N. Anderson, Albemarle. Less sickness than known before of any season of the year.

New Town Ordinance.
Be it ordained by the Commissioners for the town of Concord, N. C., that any person or persons who shall smoke upon or within ten feet of any cotton platform, cotton warehouse, or place where cotton is weighed, stored or handled, within the corporate limits of the town of Concord, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined ten dollars or imprisoned for thirty days.
