

The Southern Railway has lost thousands of dollars recently on account of cars being broken open and robbed of merchandise in transit while the trains were yet in Charlotte.

Last Wednesday night, the police of that city succeeded in locating and arresting two negroes who are thought to be the leaders of the gang of thieves.

In the possession of one of these negroes, Jonn Harris, was 48 quart bottles of corn whiskey. Ernest Crawford, the other negro under arrest, had numerous articles concealed in his home that had been taken from cars passing through Charlotte.
