### ROLLINS-BLACKBURN BOW.

Washington, Dec. 14.—The difference between the Blackburn and Rollins bow is-day reached the acute stage of open warfare. A delegation of Blackburn adherents, twenty or more strong, called first upon President Roosevelt and later upon two members of the President's official family, Foster, General Otis and Secretary Taft. It was said that not a rag of rolled linen was washed at one of these places, nor were any stations dropped from the G. O. P. chest.

### WEDDINGS IN WHITEHOUSE.

The wedding in the White House will make the coming spring season in the White House go down in history as a famous one. It is reported that the ceremony will take place in the historic East Room, so well adapted for the festive. As yet there has been no indication given by any of the family as to what will be the arrangements for the auspicious occasion. The White House will take on an added charm from now until the wedding day.

### A LIVELY WILDCAT.

It is not commonly accepted that the wildcat is so vicious as to attack human beings, and this section has lately furnished the cat that proves the exception to the rule. Albert Dennis, a guard at the Varn Turpentine Company's convict camp was Wednesday night attacked by a monster cat in Gillette Creek, more than a mile from the camp, and had not used unusual precautions of mind would most likely have been torn in pieces. The young man was returning to his quarters at a rather late hour from an evening pleasantly spent with his parents three miles distant, and upon reaching the camp of the creek was literally held off by the cat, which held the pass to the bridge beyond and refused to move when advanced upon by Mr. Dennis. Mr. Dennis has killed several cats in his time, but says this one is the biggest he has ever seen. It is said that the female cat is especially vicious during the period of nursing and the one in question was seen to be carrying young.

### Lincoln's Dearest Spirit.

James G. Blaine was profoundly impressed with the religious character of Abraham Lincoln, as exemplified in the tone of his public documents. In Blaine's book this tribute is found: "Throughout the whole period of the war he constantly directed the attention of the nation to dependence on God. It may indeed be doubted whether he omitted this in a single state paper. In every message to Congress, in every proclamation to the people, he made it prominent. In July, 1863, after the battle of Gettysburg, he called upon the people to give thanks because it has pleased Almighty God to harken to the supplications and prayers of an afflicted people, and to vouchsafe signal and effective victories to the army and navy of the United States," and he asked the people to "render homage to the Divine Majesty and to invoke the influence of His Holy Spirit to subdue the anger which has progressed and so long sustained a needless and cruel rebellion."

### MISS HANCOCK TYLER.

Miss Elizabeth Tyler, daughter of President and Mrs. John Tyler, was married in the East Room on January 31, 1842, to Mr. William Waller, of Williamsburg, Va. She was in her sixteenth year. This was a brilliant affair, attended, as the records say, by "Mrs. Madison, the members of the Cabinet, with their wives and daughters, the foreign Ministers near the Government and personal friends outside the family and their relatives."

The marriage of Miss Elizabeth Tyler, the beloved daughter of President and Mrs. U. S. Grant, who was married on May 21, 1874, to Mr. Alexander Barton, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Barton, of England. There were many readers today who will remember this function. The bride was 19 and the bridegroom 25. About 200 guests witnessed the ceremony. They included the officials of the government, the army, navy and Marine Corps and personal friends. The floral decorations of the mansion were superb, and his well remembered that the President and Mrs. Grant and the brothers of the bride accompanied the newly wedded pair to New York to see them set sail for "home." This was the last wedding in the East room.

But the last wedding in the White House was that of President Cleveland and Miss Frances Folsom, who gave to be one of the most beloved marriages of the White House. They were married in the Blue Room of the mansion on June 2, 1886. There was but a small company to witness the ceremony, the bride having come down from New York with her mother for the occasion.

This was the ninth marriage under the historic roof which has sheltered the greater number of our presidents. Only the members of Mr. Cleveland's Cabinet, with their wives and a very few personal friends of the bride and bridegroom attended. It was the first time a President has been married in the White House.

After the series of coincidences, the clans gathered at the Hotel Cochran, where Congressmen Blackburn was held for an official reception regarding the day's developments. This statement given out by Mr. Blackburn discloses much bitterness towards Quartermaster Butler and indicates that the Congressman is looking for some trouble by seeking to see the circumstances under which he entered upon an agreement to contract the marriage.

Mr. Blackburn said: "The contract was with the President was very satisfactory. Mr. Waggoner will be appointed Marshal within the next thirty days. The President heard, with much interest, the expression of the members of the delegation and he will not tolerate any foolishness on the part of those who profess to be Republicans, and who contribute what they can toward Democratic success. It was clearly shown to the President that 90 per cent of the Republicans in North Carolina are against the re-election of the man who is the third-largest in the higher Federal office and the President will heed the wishes of the people. To return to the subject of the marriage, I simply desire to say that Mr. Rollins' claim has no merit, and I am a very willing witness. I have in my possession the statement which was signed by him in June last, whereby I was to name the marshal and if he questions one word of this statement I will give it to the press. The time for juggling and double-dealing in politics is past, and so far as I am concerned, the people of the State shall know the truth. The man who occupies the position of chairman of a 3-cent party of a town, who so far forgets himself as to make a false or misleading statement to the press, is not entitled to the confidence of any part of the population. These differences might well be settled, and the sooner the better. The Republicans of North Carolina are entitled to fair dealing and honest statements. Those who believe in the truth should be small for the guarantee of a good party to feel in, and if he is not big enough to tell the truth and stand up for it, he should resign."
