A Statement by Gov. Glenn

Revised August 11, 1902. Glenn has just given the following statement regarding the lynching at Salisbury last night. "When I returned from New York City, August 2, I wrote to Sheriff Julian at Salisbury, that if he could, I would like to see the man who was lynched last night. He wrote me August 15th, that he did not think there was any necessity to call out the military, as it would not serve to impress people who seem to be willing to have a fair trial, according to law. 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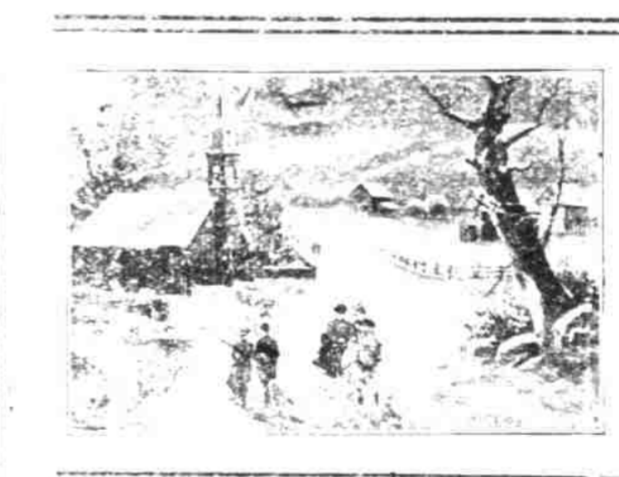
