The Southern Power Company, less than five years old, has spent more than \$10,000,000 in developing the waterpowers of this section and building a transmission system that embraces more than 1100 miles of lines for the distribution of 105,000 horsepower of electricity to the cities, towns and cotton mills and other industrial settlements of this section. The interurban trolley system in the Piedmont section alone will cost more than \$6,000,000 and the line to the coast and the branches will represent about the same figure unless the company succeeds in leasing the Seaboard line. Mr. W. S. Lee, Jr., vicepresident and manager of the company is at present in Europe in connection with the plans for the establishment of two plants for the manufacture of fertilizer, the basis of which will be nitrogen to be extracted from the atmosphere by an elecm-chemical process.
