The road has been completed from Miami to Knights Key, 11 miles, for some time, and now the last of the work to Key West is about finished and the line will be formally opened on January 20.



Morse is a Free Man.

Washington, Jan. 18.-President

Taft today commuted to expire immediately the 15-year sentence for violation of the national banking laws under which Charles W. Morse, the New York banker and "ice king, served two years in the federal penitentiary at Atlanta, Ga. The commutation of sentence, which gives Morse his complete freedom-but which, unlike a pardon, does not restore his civil rights-was granted upon recommendation of Attorney General General Wickersham and Surgeon General Torney, U. S. A. According to the Surgeon-General's report to the President on his condition, Morse could not live one month longer in confinement and even at liberty probably would not live six months.
