SUPREME COURT IS ASKED FOR DECISION

On the Constitutionality of the Wartime Prohibition Act and of the Volstead Enforcement Act.

MANY CONFLICTING DECISIONS GIVEN

The Failure of the Senate to Ratify the Treaty, Is Taken as Only Complicating the Situation, It Is Said.

Washington, Nov. 20.—The Supreme Court was asked today by determining the constitutionality of the wartime prohibition act as well as the Volstead enforcement act...

While many conflicting decisions have been rendered in various parts of the country upon the constitutionality of the act, only three cases—one from Kentucky in which the act was declared unconstitutional, and two from New York in which authority of Congress was not only to make the country dry, but to enforce it, was sustained...

Failure of the Senate to ratify the treaty of Versailles was regarded by attorneys in the cases as only complicating the situation because of the delay in the termination of a technical state of war...

Although both sides agreed that the act was unconstitutional, the arguments were not concluded until tomorrow. The first case argued was that of Kentucky distilleries and warehouse company, in which Federal Judge Evans of Louisville, Ky., declared the wartime prohibition act to be invalid and enjoined the internal revenue officials from preventing a withdrawal of a large quantity of whiskey from bonded warehouses...

Bailey's office has issued the following: This office has made a careful study of the alcoholic preparations which are at present on the market, and has come to the conclusion that a considerable number of such preparations are fit for beverage purposes...

WADE CASE COMES UP AGAIN IN SENATE

Postoffice Department Officials and Members of the Civil Service Commission Are Severely Criticized.

FAILURE TO REGARD CIVIL SERVICE RULES

Requiring the Appointment of Persons Receiving the Highest Rating, Is Alleged By Senate Committee.

(By The Associated Press) Washington, Nov. 20.—President of Senate committee on the Postoffice and Civil Service Commission today severely criticized the Postoffice Department officials and members of the Civil Service Commission...

While the appointment is for a second year, postoffice commissioners disagree with the first time a Senate committee has taken action upon this question, and the report is regarded as a precedent. In its report the committee said any other construction of the civil service regulations than that the act should be strictly construed, not only prevents the highest promotion to officers, but would also open the way for any kind of favoritism...

100 MILES PER HOUR

Mitchell Forecasts Round World Air Cruise in Almost One Day. New York, Nov. 20.—Developments in aeronautical science which may lead to airplanes of speed of 300 to 400 miles an hour and permit crossing of the Atlantic in six or seven hours and around the world in almost a day, were predicted tonight by Brigadier General William Mitchell, chief of training and operations in American Air Service...

Speaking at a dinner of the American Flying Club, the General announced that among devices on which the engineering section was working were a carburetor attachment, known as the Turbo-boost and a variable pitch propeller, which together, he said, might produce the high speed he mentioned.

Among other devices developed by the engineering section, he said, was a parachute which is even more sure in its action than the ordinary life preserver at sea; a landing gear that permits alighting on "water, ice or snow," and a "cannon," which may be fired from an airplane.

DEFENDANT IN SUIT KILLED BY A TRAIN

Woman Charged with Killing Met Death Monday at Chatham, Va. (By The Associated Press) Chatham, Va., Nov. 20.—When the case of Mrs. Ludie Barrett, of Greensboro, charged with murder of Chesley Neal, sister of her 13-year-old daughter, there was called in court here today attorneys for the defense announced that Mrs. Barrett was killed by a train Monday at Dry Fork, while on her way here to stand trial. The woman and her husband were charged jointly with the killing of Neal and the court continued Barrett's case on the next term.

Labor to Name National Ticket

Chicago, Ill., Nov. 20.—The situation of delegates has arrived in the city for the first national convention of the American Labor party, which is to be called to order here Saturday. The work of the convention is to select candidates and adopt a platform for the coming national campaign. The platform as outlined will embody three principles: Restoration of all civil liberties; ownership and democratic management of the means of transportation, communication, mines, finance and other monopolies and natural resources; and the abolition of excessive land ownership and ownership and holding land for speculative purposes.
