

PROGRESSIVES BACK DEMOCRATIC TICKET

John M. Parker and Judge Lindsey Among Those Who Urge Bull Moose Support.

Fifteen former Progressives have joined in an appeal to men and women who left the Republican Party in 1912 with Theodore Roosevelt in which they are urged to support Governor Cox and Franklin D. Roosevelt, the democratic candidates for President and Vice President.

The list of the signatories follows: Matthew Hale of Massachusetts, ex-Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Progressive National Committee; John M. Parker of Louisiana, Progressive nominee for Vice President in 1912; Francis J. Heney of California, Progressive candidate for United States Senator in 1912; Judge Ben B. Lindsey of Denver, Col., originator of the Children's Court idea; Harold L. Ickes, former Progressive leader of Illinois; Elias D. Sausbury, Chairman of the Progressive State Committee of Indiana in 1914; Joseph Misbach, Chairman of the Progressive State

Committee of Iowa; Roscoe Fitch, ex-Secretary of the Anti-Slavery League of Indiana; Antonietta Frank of Chicago; H. H. Hobbs, former Progressive National Committee member from Missouri; Edwin M. Lee, Chairman of the Progressive State Committee of Indiana in 1912; A. A. Auldridge, delegate to the Progressive National Convention from Ohio both in 1912 and 1916; Charles W. Reynolds of Covington, Ky.; George C. Rublee of New Hampshire; W. H. Nichols, ex-Progressive National Committeeman from Vermont.

Ickes Started Movement. The movement was started by Mr. Ickes. He followed Colonel Roosevelt back into the Republican Party in 1916 and was an active worker for Charles E. Hughes in the national campaign four years ago.

In this he declared his belief that Colonel Roosevelt if alive today, would be supporting Governor Cox and his kinsman, the rising mate of Governor Cox.

The text of the appeal in part follows: "The Progressive vote in 1912 came largely from Republican men and women. Some of these voters returns to the party in 1916, not on their knees, as Senator Harding prospected they would come back, but responding to the call to help the Republican Party overthrow its reactionary leadership.

"In the primaries of 1920 the Progressive sought to clean the Republican house from within. But the national convention repudiated every candidate who commanded an appreciable Progressive support, or for that matter any popular support. The convention rejected Johnson and Wood and Ladd—the candidates favored by 90 per cent of the pre-convention voting.

Fought Roosevelt Policies. "Today the independent voter is the hope of our nation and the protector of civilization. Let those who revere the memory of Roosevelt remember particularly that, in the time when a Democratic administration under Wilson was adopting and writing into law the domestic policies of Theodore Roosevelt, Senator Harding was combating those policies as revolutionary and socialist, denouncing the author as a modern Aaron Bix. Today Governor Cox is openly endorsing as his ideal of progressivism the man who led the progressive party in 1912 and Senator Harding stands, as always opposed to all those things for which Roosevelt lived and fought.

After reviewing the record of Senator Harding in Congress, the promulgators of the appeal pronounce the Republican nominee for President, a confessed and hopeless reactionary; not a leader, but one who relies wholly upon the Penrose-Lodge-Smoot leadership.

A review of the Congressional record of Governor Cox who served four years in the House of Representatives (1909-1913) concludes with a declaration that "his whole record in Congress, as indicated by his votes and utterances, has been progressive rather than standpat, favorable to Government economy, but at the same time liberal in pensions and like matters."

The appeal was formulated at a conference of the former Progressives held in Washington last week. At this meeting it was decided to open headquarters in this city and Chicago. The New York City headquarters will be established at the Murray Hill Hotel, with Edwin M. Lee, who before he became the Progressive leader of Indiana, was Chairman of the Republican State Committee in the Hoosier State, in charge. The Chicago headquarters and the work in the Fair and Middle West will be conducted under the leadership of Mr. Ickes.

WALKER SHENWELL IS FINED FOR AN ASSAULT Recorder At Lexington Imposes Fine of \$100 for Alleged Assault on Z. J. Walser.

Lexington, Oct. 7.—Baxter Shenwell was fined \$100 and costs in recorder's court here this morning on the charge of assaulting Z. J. Walser, a local attorney, with a deadly weapon yesterday morning. The weapon alleged to have been used was a walking stick. Shenwell admitted engaging in a fray with the lawyer but denied that he began the attack or struck with the stick.

The trouble began in the office of an official of a local bank and the scuffle ended in the banking room after the employees had parted the two men.

Walser was in the bank talking to an official when Shenwell entered and demanded that the former apologize for having called him a "liar" during a hearing connected with the latter's recent trial here. The prosecution claimed that when Walser refused retraction after some argument that Shenwell struck with the stick but the blow was partially ward off and the combatants clinched.

A Campaign Blunder.
