O. G. THOMAS IS PLEADED ON TRIAL TODAY

NINE JURORS CHOSEN AT MORNING SESSION OF THE COURT TODAY

Seven of the Nine Men Selected Chosen From Regular Jury and Others From Special Venire.

COURT ROOM WAS FILLED TO LIMIT

Probable That Other Three Jurors Will Be Selected This Afternoon and Testimony Start.

Nine of the twelve jurors who will try O. G. Thomas for the killing of A. J. Allen were selected at the morning session of the court, which adjourned for recess at 1 o'clock. Court reconvened again at 2:30 o'clock this afternoon. The nine jurors were selected from 17 regular jurors and 12 members of the special venire of 100 men chosen Friday afternoon. Seven of the nine jurors selected were taken from the regular jury, and the other two from the special venire.

STEEL CORPORATION HAS RIGHT TO OPERATE SHIPS

By Way of the Panama Canal, Interstate Commerce Commission Decides.

Washington, Jan. 16.—The right of the United States Steel Corporation through its subsidiaries to operate steamships by way of the Panama Canal, is upheld in a tentative report submitted today to the Interstate Commerce commission by the examiner designated to take evidence. The examiners' report, if sustained by the commission, will settle the controversy hinging about that point.

MILES PEARSON SHOT TOO

Body Found in Strip of Woods—Wife's Body Found Friday in Yard of Home.

Wilson, Jan. 16.—The body of Miles Pearson, negro, was found near his home in a clearing in a big strip of woods in the Wilsonton section of Wilson county yesterday. He had been shot, this probably occurring a week ago. Friday the body of Pearson's wife was found in the front yard of the Pearson home, she having been shot to death several days before. Police are looking for a family of negroes who lived with the Pearsons who have disappeared.

THE STREET RAILWAY STRIKE IN RICHMOND

Richmond, Va., Jan. 16.—Strikes called by platform men and sleep men employed by the Virginia Railway and Power Company in opposition to a new order, announced to begin today, were effective in varying degrees in Richmond, Norfolk and Portsmouth, according to early reports to the main offices of the company. In Portsmouth it was declared the employees ignored the strike order and every car crew reported for work today.
