BRITISH INDUSTRIAL SITUATION GLOOMY

After Several Months of Peace Industrial Strife is Again Being Experienced.—Engineers May Strike.

London, April 6.—(By the Associated Press)—A gloomy picture of the British industrial situation is presented in the American Chamber of Commerce's summary of business and economic conditions for March.

BLANTON AND GARNER HAVE VERBAL BATTLE

Rep. Garner Says That Rep. Blanton Is a "Disgrace to the House and Should Be Kicked Out."

BLANTON ATTACKED SEVERAL MEASURES

And His Speech Started Row—Sergeant at Arms Ordered to Keep Men From a Personal Encounter.

Washington, April 6.—Representative Garner, democrat of Texas, declared in the House today that if permitted by the rules to speak what was in the minds of the 355 House members he would say that Representative Blanton, of that state, "is a disgrace to this House, and ought to be kicked out."

Mr. Garner's statement, coming after Blanton had defended himself against a newspaper article, threw the House into great disorder.

Representative Blanton's speech speech, which started the row, dealt with an address recently made in Texas in which he discussed some of the things provided for members of Congress in the regular Office Building stores.
