AT TRAINING SCHOOL

Mrs. Koons went to Spencer from this During Fourteen Years the School Has Been in Operation Only Two Students Have Died From Disease.

> What officials of the school believe to be a record for State institutions has been made at the Jackson Training School, the State's school of correction for boys, located near here. Since its organization in January, 1909, there have been but two deaths from disease among the students, and during the 14 years of its life the

school has cared for 1,500 boys.

This record was brought to public attention last week when one of the students at the school died of pneumonia. The other death from disease occurred several years. In addition to these two deaths there has been but hitting on all four. > This record is the more remarkable, health officials here state, when it is remembered that most of the students they usually are very suscertible to lisease of all kinds. There are diseases in the school, to be sure, but he boys are given every possible atention as attested by the fine health

record of which the school can boast. During the influenza epidemic in 1918 there were 90 cases of the disease in the school at one time, but there weeks, having been returned to the were no deaths. A large corps of nurses was employed by the school during the epidemic, and though a number of students were seriously ill each recovered.

In addition to the exercise which the students receive at their work outof-doors, there are regular hours for recreation and physical exercise, and he exercises are given by a competent instructor, who knows just what the youth needs.

At regular intervals the students re given careful physical examinations and any defects discovered dur ing the examinations are immediately remedied. Once each year, the State Roard of Health sends a corps of nurses and surgeons to the school and the tonsils of the boys are examined and treated. About 90 boys last year had their tonsils removed,

In the same way the teeth of the boys are kept in good shape. Under the direction of the State Board of Health a dentist visits the school each year and gives treatment to the students needing it. All of the students at regular inter-

vals are given the typhoid serum by members of the Cabarrus County Health Department. There has been no typhoid fever at the school since it as opened.

When one of the students at the chool becomes ill the school physician is immediately called. If he deems it necessary to call in a trained nurse, the young fellow who died last week of pneumonia the school authorities engaged two trained nurses, and every possible medical aid was given the

oungster The health record this institution has made shows not only that the officials of the school are using every means to keep the students in a healthy condition, but it also speaks well for health conditions in this section. The school is located on a high ridge southeast of Concord, is built on a rocky soil that offers a wonderful water supply, and is surrounded by a large number of pine trees.
