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COMMENCEMENT AT GRAMMAR SCHOOLS VERY SUCCESSFUL

Exercises at Central and No. 2 Attended by Two Audiences That More Than Filled Auditoriums of Schools

Members of the graduating classes of Central Grammar School and No. 2 School presented their commencement exercises before large audiences Thursday evening, and the programs were described by those present as interesting as ever presented in the two schools.

At both schools not only seating in the auditorium room was a permit, but in the case of the Central school, the auditorium was filled to the top of the building.

The presentation of certificates to graduates and the presentation of diplomas were the features of the exercises at each school. The full list of graduates and marshals of the two schools are carried in another column of this paper today.

The certificates at Central were presented by Mr. John M. Ogden, W. Oglesby declared that his advice to young people today is "Stay South, Stay Man," declaring that the States and particularly North Carolina had given civilization much credit, and that the greatest achievement of North Carolina is "the opportunity given every child to get an education."

"Keep on, keep on keeping on," he told the graduates, "and so long as you show a desire to get a better education your parents and friends will back you to the limit. The present day school facilities are the contributions you make for your children and friends have made for you. What will be your contribution to the future? It is your duty to take advantage of the opportunities offered, that you may better serve your State."

"North Carolina and America are depending upon you to prepare yourself to make your city, State and nation great. The command is Forward! Be certain that you will excel in command and add honor and glory to your town and nation."

"Let's Go Traveling," an oration was presented at Central, and the "Royalty in Old Virginia," was presented at No. 2. Students taking part in the two plays had been carefully drilled and they played their parts to perfection. To name the stars would be a repetition of the cast of characters.

Work in the two schools was closed Thursday. The students returned the following morning, but only to receive their promotion cards. Work in both schools has been most satisfactory. Prof. A. S. Webb, superintendent of the city schools, stated at the conclusion of the exercises Thursday.

NAME NEW EAST SOUTHERN TRAIN

"Piedmont Limited" is Title Given Fastest Train Operated by System

The "Piedmont Limited" is the new Saturday train operated by the Southern Railway system between New York and New Orleans, each one of which passes through Concord daily.

The trains, the fastest operated by the Southern system, were put into service April 29 and have since been operating simply as No. 33 and No. 34, but are now announced that a name will be assigned later, in a contest participated in by persons all over the country.

The Southern Railway and affiliated lines over which the train runs, offer a prize of \$200 for the best name which the thousands of Shriners who are planning to attend the convention June 5th to 7th, 1923.

Stations for delivery of mail and the transaction of other postal business will be established at the headquarters of the several temples represented at the convention. A general postoffice for the special convenience of Shriners and other visitors attending the convention will be established on Pennsylvania Avenue, between 11th and 12th Sts., to be known as the Shrine postoffice. These stations will be opened between 8 a. m. and 12 o'clock midnight.

Mail for Shriners and others should be addressed to the hotel, the street address of the house where they are stopping, or in care of the temple with which they are connected, or should be marked "Shrine." Mail bearing a specific address, such as a hotel or street number, will be delivered accordingly.

Mail addressed in care of a temple will be delivered from the station at the headquarters of that temple.

All other mail bearing the word "Shrine" will be delivered from the Shrine postoffice.

Unless mail is specifically addressed by one of these methods, Shriners may fail to receive it during their brief stay in Washington.
