Washington, Aug. 16 .- The Interstate Commerce Commission today approved the application of the Southern Railway for authority to assume as lessee the obligations and liability of paying as rental an annual sum sufficient to pay the interest and provide a sinking fund for the bonds of \$1,300,000 to be issued by the City of Greensboro, N. C. The funds derived from the sale of the bonds will be used for the construction of a passenger terminal. The bonds will mature in 30 years from October 1 and will bear 5 per cent. interest.
