Another Important New Street in Asheville. Asheville, N. C., Oct. 29.—Work expected to start next Monday on new street connecting this city's downtown district with the section known as West Asheville. The new street is expected to relieve lower Patton avenue, one of the principal thoroughfares of the city, now often congested with heavy traffic.
