don Campbell in December 1922, about Campbell's employment of Senator Wheeler.



Mount McKinley Sinking Because of Earthquakes.

McKinley Park, Alaska, April 16 .--Tradition has it that Mount McKinley, the loftiest peak on the American continent, sinks about two feet a year from its official altitude of 20,300 feet.
