

Bailey Admits Defeat as Total for M'Lean Grows

State Candidate in Formal Statement Issued This Morning Admits That He Has Been Defeated.

ERHAM LEADING JAMES P. COOK

Reports From Half of Precincts Show Cabarrus Man Behind.—Second Primary in Several of Contests.

June 9.—Joshua W. Bailey, in a formal statement issued this morning, admitted his defeat in the gubernatorial nomination for Governor against M. C. McLean, of Lumberton.

June 9. (By the Associated Press.) Agnes W. McLean, of North Carolina, and former Assistant Secretary of the Treasury, was leading the primary, by more than 200 votes early today for the gubernatorial nomination for Governor of North Carolina.

Mr. Bailey was leading in only four of the 1,719 precincts reported out of 1,718. The vote early today was as follows: McLean 107,183; Bailey 106,990.
