The communication sent to the Amerina minister protested against the situation in Persia which culminated in the provoking attack on Mrs. Imbrie.

## REVOLT IN DRAZIL CHULU ANU REBELS LEAVE SIEGED CITY

Handwriting Experts Called Washington and New York Get Advices Declaring the Rebels Have Been Withdrawn From Sao Paulo.

> SANTOS CITIZENS ARE CELEBRATING

Second Week of the Hearing That City In Brazil Also Advised Rebel Leaders Have Withdrawn Forces From City They Attacked.

Washington, July 28 .- Withdrawal of the revolutionary forces from Sao Paulo the hearing which will decide the fate and the occupation of that city by the Brazilian government forces was announced today in advices received by

The department advices were based on dispatches from the admiral commanding the Brazilian naval forces, which said all Americans in Sao Paulo were found to be safe when the city was taken over by the government forces.

Government Forces Control City. Buenos Aires, Argentina, July 28 (By the Associated Press) .- The Rio Janeiro correspondent of La Nacion reports that in a parlor car for Mr. Franks as hav- the Jornal do Commercia, Brazilian government organ, has posted a placard in ward the interior, leaving the entire city of Sao Paulo in the hands of govern-

ment forces. The placard declared that the revolutionists abandoned the city after strong pressure by the legal forces, and fled toward the interior with two reduced columns in special trains. The bulletin added that Gen. Azevio was in possession of the city of Itu, about 40 miles southwest of Sao Paulo, and that he would prevent the escape of the rebel forces.

People Celebrate. Santos, Brazil, July 28 (By the Associated Press) .- Whistles were blowing in Santos this morning in celebration of rumore that the revolutionists had abaudoned Sao Paulo during the night, the government taking over the city. As yet, there is no official confirmation of the

New York Hears Revolution Is Over.
