

Withdraws Address Made Saturday Attacking Party. Robinson is Vitriolic. Washington, Jan. 7 .- Bitterly assailed in the open senste by leaders of his party. Senator Dial. Democrat, South Carolina, finally withdrew today from the permanent record his address of last Saturday blaming Democratic members of Congress for the party's defeat last November.

Thus was closed one incident in the row which began on the Democratic side late last month with the delivery by Senator Bruce, Democrat, Maryland, of an address of import similar to that by Senator Dial. The Maryland senator, toch has been the object of open assaults by the regularly constituted leaders among the Democrats, but his address till stands the record.


