

BRYAN IS OPPOSED AT

PRESBYTERIAN ASSEMBLY

Militant Fundamentalists Will Fight Dr. Thornton, the Bryan Choice For Moderator.

Columbus, Ohio, May 21.-The 137th general assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America opening here today saw militant fundamentalists going into the fight for the moderatorship at odds with Wm. Jennings Bryan, most prominent of the conservatives in the group's selection of a candidate.

Mr. Bryan is standing firmly for Dr. W. O. Thompson, President of the Ohio State University of Columbus, Ohio, for the post, while other fundamentalists at the conference decided to back Dr. Lapsley A. McAfee, of Berkeley, Cal.

> Indictment Against "Baby Farm" Proprietor.


