While the crosses blazed and flared resulting in the calling out of the Fire Department in two districts, Klan orators criticised the Government speeches at the Klavern. Klansmen de clared the City Administration, a new one sponsored by business men, had dis charged Klanemen from municipal posi

tions and brought heads of departments from other cities when Fort Worth men were applicants. The new regime is presided over by

a Council of nine business men and City Manager. The latter was secure in Dubuque, Ia.
