# TWO ROBBERS WILL DIE FOR SLAYING OF HOTEL EMPLOYE

Two of 5 Men Who Robbed **Fashionable Drake Hotel** In Chicago and Killed Cashier, Found Guilty.

**INSANITY PLEA** DID NOT WORK

Defense Counsel Also Suggested That the Men Be Given Life Imprisonment But This Pleas Failed.

Chicago, Sept. 17.—(A)—Joseph Holmes and Jack Woods, two of five robbers who a few weeks ago invaded the fashionable Drake Hotel and staged a pistol battle in an attempted holdup, were convicted early today by a jury of murder of Frank B. Rodkey, hotel cashier, and given the death

The jury deliberated for more than nine hours, until nearly dawn today, and several times were reported dead-locked at 9 tc3 and 10 to 2 for a hanging verdict, the minority holding out for life imprisonment on the ground that the pair is insane.

The defense relied on the insanity plea and in the closing arguments declared there were many lnstances in which persons accused of murder had pleaded guilty and been sentenced only to life imprisonment.

The prosecution called 46 witnesses.

Various Conferences in the South Already Have MEET FRENCHMEN Taken Action on the Proposed Merger.

Nashville, Tenn., Sept. 17 .- (A)-

The fifteenth conference of the Meth-

odist Episcopal Church, South, which meets in October with the Holston and Louisville conference which convene September 30th, will largely determine the success or failure of the pending plan of Methodist unification. With the adjournment of the Misouri conference September 14th the vote on unification stood 211 in favor, 370 against the measure, the Missouri conference polled the largest vote of any conference which has met to date, voting 196 to 14 in favor of unificaion. The Holston and Louisville conferences are as large if not larger han the Missouri, but the issues in hese conferences are more sharply

The Holston is the first of Bishop Edwin Mouzon's conferences to convene. The result in the Tennessee and Memphis, the other two conferences over which the unification leader had jurisdiction, is said to be exremely doubtful.

In the Kentucky conference which met recently the merger plan was lost by one vote, the poll being 87 for, and 88 against. Bishop U. V. W. Darlington, one of the 5 minority bishops opposed the plan, is president of the two conferences in Kentucky. The Western North Carolina conference convenes at Statesville Octo-

## PLANS FOR FUNDING FRANCE'S DEBT TO BE OUTLINED SOON

Conferences Will Be Started in Capital One Week From Today After the French Officials Arrive.

IN NEW YORK CITY

Plans for Meeting Thursday Will Give the French One Eentire Day After Arrival to Perfect Plans.

Washington, Sept. 17 .- (A)-Negotiations for the funding of France's \$4,000,000,000 debt to the United States will begin here one week from

Acting Secretary Winston of the Treasury, the Secretary of the American debt commission, issued a call today for a meeting of the American commission at 10 o'clock next Thursday morning, by which time the French mission headed by Finance Minister Caillaux will have arrived in Washington.

The President has asked Mr. Win ston and Myron T. Herrick, American Ambassador to France, to meet the French mission in New York. French Ambassador Daeschner also will be there. Plans contemplate an immediate

trip from New York to Washington and this will permit the French dele gation to have next Wednesday to prepare for the formal meeting the next day, Meantime Treasury experts and members of the American commis-sion are gathering all data having a

bearing on the French economic and physical position. The Treasury now has 10 volumes representing individual and unofficial studies bearing on the French capacity to pay.
