Madison, Wis., Sept. 24.—(A)—Gov. Blaine, of Wisconsin, today made public a telegram he sent to President Coolidge declaring that before conversations are entered upon with France upon settlement of the war debt, America should demand "a halt in this ruthless warfare between the French and Riffians in Morocco."
