OTHER CHARGES NOW PENDING

Two Specific Charges Are Covered in the New Decision Handed Down in the Case.

Washington, D. C., Dec. 7 .- (A)-The Fall-Doheny bribery indictments which were squashed several months ago in the lower courts here were held to be valid today by the District of Columbia Court of Appeals.

A plea in abatement filed by former Secretary Albert B. Fall, Edward L. Doheny, oil magnate, and his son, Erward L. Doheny, Jr., which the lower court granted, was overruled by Chief Justice George F. Martin on motion of the government's special oil counsel, Atlee Pomerene and Owen J

Roberts. Two indictments were conveyed by the court's decision, one charging of receiving a bribe of \$100,000 to influence his official action respecting certain oil leases, and the other charging the Doheny's with giving the bribe.
