APPOINTMENTS ARE READ AT GASTONIA M. E. CONFERENCE

Gastonia, Oct. 25.—(AP)—Reading of appointments by Bishop Mouzon brought to a close here today the annual meeting of the Western North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

Today was to the ministers of the conference and their families the most important day of the five-day session. It was on this day that they were to learn whether or not they will remain in their present homes for another year, or move to other fields.

Methodist ministers are appointed annually and all appointments are made by the bishop. These appointments are zealously guarded until the moment of their being read, and it is seldom that they are obtainable prior to their reading by the bishop.

TANK FARM BLAZE KILLS TWO AND 10 OTHERS WERE HURT

One Other Man Is Missing as a Result of the Fire at the New Sour Lake Field.

FRED TUFF ONE OF THE VICTIMS Fire Raged for 14 Hours, and the Property Damage Is Now Estimated at \$500,000.

Beaumont, Texas, Oct. 25.—(AP)—Two men are dead, another is missing, and ten were in a hospital here today following a tank farm fire at the New Sour Lake field, 25 miles west of here, which raged for fourteen hours yesterday, causing damage estimated at \$500,000.

Fred Tuff, general superintendent of the Humphreys Oil Corporation, and a former chief of the United States Bureau of Mines, was killed and an unidentified companion of Tuff is thought to have been burned to death when a 500-barrel tank near which they were standing exploded.

LUTHERANS DECIDE TO STUDY SCHOOLS FOR DENOMINATION

Commission Is Appointed to Make Survey With Purpose of Getting Data for Unified Program Later.

INSTITUTIONS TO BE VISITED LATER Junior Colleges and Academies of Church Will Get Attention of Recently Appointed Commission.

Richmond, Oct. 25.—(AP)—Details of a two-year survey of Lutheran colleges, to be undertaken immediately by a commission of the board of education of the church were given the fifth biennial convention of the United Lutheran Church in America today in the report of the board.

Dr. Robert J. Leonard and Dr. Edward S. Evenden, both professors of education in teachers college, Columbia University, New York, have been appointed as joint directors of the survey.

ANOTHER INCREASE FOR COTTON CROP IS NEW FORECAST

Today's Government Report Forecasts Cotton Crop of 17,454,000 Bales, a Big Increase.

8,722,066 BALES ALREADY GINNED Previous Report Called for Crop of 16,627,000 Bales.—Condition Figures Are Not Given.

Washington, Oct. 25.—(AP)—A cotton crop of 17,454,000 bales of 500 pounds gross weight is indicated for this year, the Department of Agriculture announced today.

Previous report on indicated production based on October 1st condition placed the crop at 16,627,000 bales, and the acre yield at 168.4 pounds. Last year's crop was 12,103,679 bales and the acre yield 167.2 pounds. The indicated production by states include:

Ten of These Killed in North Carolina and 23 Others Hurt in State. (By the Associated Press) Fifty-one persons lost their lives and 260 were injured in traffic accidents in eleven southern states during the week ended October 23rd, according to a compilation by the Associated Press.

Louisiana reported the highest number of injured, with forty, while Alabama which had four deaths was low in the injured column, with thirteen.

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
